Location: 25.8 N 95.1 W or 186 miles from Port Aransas Maximum Sustained Winds: 45 MPH with gusts to 58 MPH Present Movement: West-Northwest at 18 MPH Minimum Central Pressure: 1004 mb



Forecast:

Tropical Storm Harold is forecast to move inland this morning and is expected to weaken as it tracks westward across South Texas toward the Rio Grande this afternoon. Rainbands will move inland through the morning and be capable of producing tropical storm force wind gusts, heavy rainfall, and brief tornadoes. Along area beaches, storm surge is expected to produce Moderate coastal flooding with the potential for water to reach the dunes and beach access roads. There is also a high risk for rip currents as large swells reach the Texas coast.

South Texas Impacts:

See impacts graphic below for areal indicator on where highest impacts are expected.

Winds: Sustained winds of 40-50 MPH with gusts up to 60-70 MPH.

Elevated

- Damage to porches, awnings, carports, sheds, and unanchored mobile homes. Unsecured lightweight objects blown about.
- Many large tree limbs broken off. A few trees snapped or uprooted, but with greater numbers in places where trees are shallow rooted. Some fences and roadway signs blown over.
- A few roads impassable from debris, particularly within urban or heavily wooded places. Hazardous driving conditions on bridges and other elevated roadways.

• Scattered power and communications outages.

Storm Surge/Coastal Flooding: Storm surge of 1-3 feet of beach inundation is expected on Tuesday.

Elevated

- Localized inundation with storm surge flooding mainly along immediate shorelines and in low-lying spots, or in areas farther inland near where higher surge waters move ashore.
- Sections of near-shore roads and parking lots become overspread with surge water. Driving conditions dangerous in places where surge water covers the road.
- Moderate beach erosion. Heavy surf also breaching dunes, mainly in usually vulnerable locations. Strong rip currents.
- Minor to locally moderate damage to marinas, docks, boardwalks, and piers. A few small craft broken away from moorings.

Rainfall: 3-5 inches of rain is expected with isolated amounts to 7 inches possible through this afternoon.

Elevated

- Localized rainfall flooding may prompt a few evacuations.
- Rivers and tributaries may quickly rise with swifter currents. Small streams, creeks, canals, and ditches may become swollen and overflow in spots.
- Flood waters can enter a few structures, especially in usually vulnerable spots. A few places where rapid ponding of water occurs at underpasses, low-lying spots, and poor drainage areas. Several storm drains and retention ponds become near-full and begin to overflow. Some brief road and bridge closures.

Tornadoes: There is a low chance for a couple of tornadoes across South Texas through this afternoon.

Elevated

- The occurrence of isolated tornadoes can hinder the execution of emergency plans during tropical events.
- A few places may experience tornado damage, along with power and communications disruptions.
- Locations could realize roofs peeled off buildings, chimneys toppled, mobile homes pushed off foundations or overturned, large tree tops and branches snapped off, shallow-rooted trees knocked over, moving vehicles blown off roads, and small boats pulled from moorings.



Forecaster Considerations

Confidence is relatively high in the coastal impacts from this storm across South Texas. The main uncertainty in the forecast is where the isolated heavier rainfall totals are most likely to occur. However, given the dry soil will be able to absorb a lot of water, isolated to scattered flash flooding will be most likely in urban areas or typical low spots.
